## Tourism-Copenhagen

51 students filled out the survey corresponding to 39%. 34 of these were 7<sup>th</sup> semester students and 17 9<sup>th</sup> semester students.

73% state they spend 40+ hours or between 30-40 hours. 77% between 20-30 hours. This is very acceptable. In comparison to this the self-perception of work efforts has 78% answer that their work-load is satisfactory. Follow-up comments tell us that some students find the work-load to be heavy with too much reading.

The respondents generally feel well-informed about coherence between study activities in the semester (67%). The assessment of the academic benefit is acceptable but can be improved. 48% find it to be average, 48% big and 5% small. On the positive side both indicators were a point of concern last year so we are happy to witness an improvement.

The respondents declare the most important competences obtained to be the understanding of stakeholders and destination development, the ability to analyze and discuss particular problematics, critical thinking and understanding the complexities of the tourism industry.

The number of respondents decline when we look at the second part of the survey and around 20 students have answered to these questions.

100% (n = 21) of the respondents took part in group work while writing projects. 65% completely agrees or agrees to the question if the group work went well. 5% disagrees.

67% of the respondents feel well-informed about practical issues. In regards to knowledge, skills and competences 48% assesses the outcome as big, 48% as average and 5% as small. The percentage corresponds to 10, 10 and 1 students.

The physical conditions is given mixed assessments.

The evaluation of the study community is positive (75% satisfactory). A majority also agrees or completely agrees (81%) to thriving at their education.
